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A MESSAGE FROM THE CEO

Dear DDF Supporters,

None of us could have predicted the lingering effects that the COVID-19 pandemic would have on our families, our communities, and our daily lives. In 2021, Debbie's Dream Foundation: Curing Stomach Cancer (DDF) found a way to balance new norms and persist in our mission to raise awareness, fund research, educate patients and caregivers, and support the stomach cancer community. From the start of the pandemic, our number one concern has been to keep our staff and the stomach cancer community safe, informed, and supported. This is why our transition to a fully remote workplace has helped lay the foundation for expanding many of our programs and creating others by providing virtual access to resources for those who need it most.

The challenges of the global pandemic created a catalyst and a turning point that brought to light issues of access to care and health inequalities throughout the world. In 2021, we refocused our programs to address some of these issues to meet those needs. Our Patient Resource Education Program offers free stomach cancer educational webinars and symposia, and stomach cancer support groups. We followed CDC guidelines to provide hybrid in-person and virtual options for our signature symposia events this year. In doing so, we saw our highest registration numbers ever in 2021, with people tuning in worldwide. Earlier in the year, we expanded our commitment to mental health and support by partnering with CancerCare to create the first-ever Stomach Cancer Helpline. The service features social workers who aim to alleviate distress and help patients obtain the best possible outcomes during their treatment journey.


Additionally, we are proud to have launched our Health Equity Program to help highlight and address many healthcare disparities that plague the Black, Indigenous, and People of Color populations within the stomach cancer community. Furthermore, our signature Advocacy Day was a great success as we continued to increase the amount of federal funding allocated to stomach cancer every year- virtually!. We also continued our commitment to fund research and allotted an additional \$200,000 for cutting-edge research in the latest advancements for gastric cancer.

These critical transitions were made possible due to the unwavering support of our dedicated Board of Directors, staff, volunteers, donors, industry partners, and the resilient individuals who make up the stomach cancer community. Because of your support, we continue to rise to the occasion as we press forward in our mission and overcome the challenges that accompany these evolving times. 
CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER



PROGRAMS OVERVIEW

Our Patient Resource Education Program offers many free stomach cancer support services to patients, families, and caregivers. When a patient is diagnosed, they, their families, and their caregiver can apply to request a peer mentor. In 2021, we launched our state-of-the-art mentor matching platform, helping patients communicate, identify learning solutions, find peer-to-peer support and effectively connect in one space. Through our mentor program, patients can better understand their diagnosis, staging, treatment options, clinical trials, side effects, and disease management. Mentors share their stories, tips, advice, and concerns with others, so they feel supported along their journey.

DDF also hosted various online education programs, including monthly stomach cancer support groups, webinars, and symposia topics covering the continuum of cancer treatments. All programs are free for patients, families, caregivers, the general public, and health care professionals. Educational programs are recorded and archived in the Lecture Library section of the DDF website.









MENTOR MATCHING PROGRAM

In 2021, we launched a state-of-the-art digital platform that uses smart-matching algorithms to pair patients and families with moral support and help build community.

MIND, BODY, SPIRIT FACEBOOK LIVE SERIES

During the 2020 pandemic, we launched the Mind, Body, Spirit Facebook LIVE Series as part of our COVID-19 Resources and Support Program to address cancer's mental and emotional impact on the stomach cancer community. This initiative continued through 2021 as we covered topics including meditation, yoga, overcoming anxiety and stress, and the power of positive thinking.





HEALTH EQUITY & INCLUSION PROGRAM

The pandemic helped highlight social, economic, and health disparities plaguing Black, Indigenous, and People of Color (BIPOC) populations. In response, DDF launched our Health Equity and Inclusion Program in 2021 to help fill the gap in access to information and resources in the BIPOC community. While we recognize that health equity is an aspiration, we are dedicated to playing our part in providing solutions that help make healthcare as inclusive and equal as possible.




STOMACH CANCER HELPLINE

STOMACH CANCER EDUCATIONAL WEBINARS



2021 GASTROESOPHAGEAL CANCER EDUCATIONAL SYMPOSIUM

DDF collaborated with Mayo Clinic to host a Gastroesophageal Cancer Educational Symposium on Saturday, July 31, 2021, at Mayo Clinic in Rochester, Minnesota. The event was attended both in-person and virtually and was led by Surgical Oncologist Dr. Travis E. Grotz and Thoracic Surgeon, and Professor Dr. Shanda Blackmon. The symposium featured topics such as genetics, endoscopic treatments, pathology reports, immunotherapy, proton and radiation therapy, circulating tumors, and nutrition. In addition, attendees heard from patients during the two patient panel discussions held between sessions.





2021 INTERNATIONAL GASTRIC CANCER EDUCATIONAL SYMPOSIUM

We partnered with the Korean Cancer Association (KCA) to host a record-high 935 virtual attendees during the International Gastric Cancer Educational Symposium on Thursday, June 17, 2021, in Seoul, Korea. The symposium was led by Dr. Han- Kwang Yang, Director, and Professor of Surgery at the Seoul National University Hospital in Seoul, Korea, and Chairman of the Board of Directors for KCA. Participants from over 50 countries tuned in to presentations by medical experts from Korea, China, Japan, and the United States to help bridge the gap on early detection issues and highlight the differences in treatment options between the western and eastern world.


COOKING MEALS FOR THE STOMACH CANCER PATIENT

Chef Zach was joined by Clinical Oncology Dietician Mary-Eve Brown of Johns Hopkins to answer commonly asked questions and bring stomach cancer patients a variety of deliciously modified meals that they could enjoy.



Our annual Stomach Cancer Capitol Hill Advocacy Day is attended by advocates from all over the country. For the past nine years, advocates have met with Congress to discuss and urge lawmakers to maintain and increase federal funding for stomach cancer research. In 2021, we hosted the 9th Annual Stomach Cancer Capitol Hill Advocacy Day virtually on February 11 and 12. The annual meetings, typically held on Capitol Hill in Washington, D.C., presented an opportunity for nearly 200 stomach cancer patients, family members, and caregivers to meet virtually with Congress members and share their personal stories and the latest facts and statistics about stomach cancer. These consistent efforts help ensure that stomach cancer remains eligible for funding through the Department of Defense's Peer-Reviewed Cancer Research Program.




